

The EMA program was established in 2005 by the School of International Relations and Public Affairs (SIRPA). It provides an opportunity of studying the political, diplomatic, and administrative reality of China for foreign students. All academic courses are taught in English. Our mission is to enhance both students' analytical skills and their knowledge of China, with a purpose to build up a solid foundation for professional career. In 2010, 12 students from 12 countries got their MA degrees, 16 students from 9 countries were enrolled into this program. The program admits both degree and non-degree students according to a competitive basis.

The EMA degree program requires a two-year full-time study. For non-degree students, they can study for one or two semesters. We offer courses including Political Development in Modern China, Chinese Diplomacy, Chinese Public Administration, International Politics, Global Governance, Chinese Modern History, International Relations in East Asia, Political Economy in East Asia, Research Methods, and Seminar Series on Chinese and World Affairs. The Faculty members have a diverse background and some of them received their Ph.D. degrees abroad.



Application for Admission

Degree program applicants are required to submit the application form, official copies of previous diplomas, official copies of transcripts, two letters of recommendation, official copies of TOEFL or IELTS scores, resume, statement of purpose, a writing sample paper, and a copy of passport.

The EMA (CPD) program is sponsored by the School of International Relations and Public Affairs (SIRPA). The school was founded on November 21st, 2000. Its predecessor is the Department of International Politics, whose further predecessor, the Department of Political Science, was founded in 1923. The distinguished faculty members at SIRPA are making serious efforts in educating current and future leaders of China.

SIRPA has established a strong international network and is active in promoting academic and educational interaction in the international community. Each year students from North America, Europe, Africa and Asia enter SIRPA to receive education at various levels.

O Core Courses

Political Development in Modern China

This course strives to capture the continuous drama of the Chinese struggle for national revival through political, social and economic modernization. It deals with fundamental questions as why China went communist in time



of national crisis since mid 19th century; how the PRC regime tried to industrialize the economy and society through state mobilization in 50s and 60s; how that mobilization model ran into a dead end at the end of 70s; and finally how the market oriented reforms and opening up to the outside world in the past 30 years have transformed the socio-economics and the state-society relations in today's China.

International Politics

This is a required course for Master students of the CPD Program. This course is designed to assist students in acquiring knowledge about international politics and theories. The goal of the course is to provide students with a thorough understanding of international politics from both theoretical and factual perspectives. Since international politics as a subject is very complex, this course is designed to present students not with everything, but with the fundamentals, the essentials, the basics, of international politics. This course will mainly focus on contending theories, i.e., different theoretical perspectives, on international relations (IR). Students are required to not only understand various IR theories, as well as their relations, but also employ those theories to describe, explain, and predict international events.



Chinese Public Administration

This course is designed to enhance a student's understanding of the history, context, and current issues of public administration in China, with a focus on the development since the initiation of economic reform in late 1970s. In addition to achieving knowledge of China's administrative systems and their reforms, the course is designed to sharpen student's ability to think and write analytically about the various aspects of China's public administration.

Chinese Diplomacy (1949-2010)

This course provides students with a comprehensive introduction to contemporary China's diplomacy and its foreign policy, as well as their theoretical, historical background. This course will also investigate the decision-making system of Chinese foreign policy, China's bilateral relations with major powers, China's multilateral relations with its neighboring countries, developing countries and international organizations. Emphasis will be placed on the period since 1978 when China initiated its reform and open-up era. Readings will be drawn from political science, history, and international relations theories written by both Chinese and Western scholars.
